Horticultural Show .-- We would remind our readers that the Flower Show is fixed to take place in the Vicarage garden, on Wednesday, July 14th. It is hoped that there will be a display of flowers, fruit, vegetables and honey, which will equal-if not excel-all our former efforts. An additional attraction is promised in the shape of a drill performance to be given at 6 o'clock by the members of the Hampton Fire Brigade, under the command of their captain, Mr. R. G. Graham. It will be remembered that the Hampton Fire Brigade took the 2nd prize at a recent competition at the Westminster Aquarium.

Crystal Palace Excursion -The annual expedition of our Sunday School took place on Thursday, June 17th. The day was fine, but the temperature chilly, almost wintry, but this did not cool the ardour of the excursionists, and all went off very well. There was a performance of Japanese athletes, one of whom did wondrous things spinning a wooden barrel and a Japanese umbrella on his feet, and built up a pile, the foundation of which was the upturned soles of his feet, then four baskets inserted one by one, then a monster tambourine on its edge, one boy inside and another on the top. Another balanced a long ladder on his shoulder, on the top of which a boy performed; and another hung by his legs from the ceiling, and suspended from his hand three boys who were performing antics in mid-air. When the roll was counted, one boy was missing, so that it was necessary to leave an escort behind, but he turned up in time to return by the next train. The usual procession through the village with flags and band was the finish to a very enjoyable day.

Our Summer Amusements.—Advocates of out-door games and athletic sports must need admit that we are well supplied with clubs to promote such like health-giving and innocent amusements. Cricket, which is generally acknowledged by Englishmen to hold the first place of importance among games, is well provided for. The Fulwell Club has ceased to exist from the difficulty of getting adequate support, but the old Club, which has now united with the Hamptonians, under the title of the Hampton 'United' Cricket Club, has a full programme, and bids fair to uphold the reputation of the parish in the cricket world. Two junior clubs, the 'Crescent' and the 'Union Jack,' promise a succession of players for seasons which are yet in the future. The Hampton Hill Lawn Tennis Club is in full force, and most evenings and every Saturday afternoon its members, both ladies and gentlemen, play on their excellent ground near the Park Whilst speaking of summer amusements, we must not Terrace. forget that winter also has its share, and our two football clubs, the 'Grasshoppers' and the 'Crescent,' play capital matches throughout the colder season.

Grammar School Foundation Scholarship.—We have every reason to be satisfied with the result of the Examination. The three boys from our School, W. Gernat, H. Barwell, and A. Hambley, occupy respectively the 1st, 2nd and 3.d places on the examination list, and the former obtains the scholarship which gives him free education at the Grammar School for the next three years.

Our Schools' Finances. -- This month the subscriptions are collected, and it may be well to urge again their great importance in the maintenance of the Schools. A glance at our last balance sheet, shows that subscriptions supply but a small part of the funds, little more than one-seventh of the whole, but it is just that part upon which voluntary schools depend for their very existence. If this comparatively small sum cannot be raised, the Voluntary School must disappear, and the Board School, which will cost us at least one third as much again, will take its place. Does this mean that instead of £90 subscriptions, we shall have to pay £120 in the shape of a rate? No! it means this. Our Schools cost us £600 a year now, and a Board School would probably cost £800. The School Pence and Government Grant supply £500, and would, under a Board, supply no more, probably less, so that instead of £90 in subscriptions now, we shall have to pay £300 by rate then. It is well that ratepayers should remember that it is a real economy to them to support the voluntary school and thus avoid a very large addition to our rates. A heavy expenditure for repairs is necessary this year, which makes it more important that those who kindly undertake the collectors' work should be well received.
