The usual Band will be in attendance. Mrs. de Wette has kindly consented to distribute the Prizes.

**Bazaars.**—We have to congratulate our friends of the Congregational Church on the great success of their recent Bazaar, by which the very satisfactory sum of £140 was raised for the improvement of the organ and general repairs. Their example shows us that it is quite within the range of possibility to clear about half our tower and spire debt by such means, if people will only work with a will. It will be impossible, so soon after this one and with another just held at Twicken-

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ham, which has realised £400, to hold ours during the present year, but we trust that during the summer of 1889 that there may be such a display of the useful and ornamental as will throw all previous efforts into the shade.

Hampton Hill Lawn Tennis Club.—Two Tournaments have been played during the past month and have been the means of bringing together large numbers of members and friends. The first was for prizes given by Mr. Henry Bowling; the final round being between Miss May Barlow and Mr. W. H. B. Wix against Miss Florence Barlow and Mr. W. C. B. Hall—the former winning the odd set, although each couple won the same number of games. The second tournament was for prizes given by Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Roberts, which were won by Miss Florence Barlow and Mr. Walter H. White, after a severe struggle in the final with Miss Inez Roe and Mr. Frank Jefferson, who played a very plucky game up to the last stroke. The fall of the ceilings in the Infants' School (noticed last month) turned out much more serious than at first anticipated, the whole of two rooms having eventually to be done. No arrangements have yet been made for collecting the School funds, the number of volunteers being insufficient. A School Board seems almost inevitable, but in any case the existing Schools must be carried on till the end of October so as not to lose the Government Grant.

The only thing that can save us from a School Board will be the speedy adoption by the Government of the Report of the Royal Commission on Education. This highly satisfactory document recommends that "the local authority should be empowered to supplement from "local rates the voluntary subscriptions given in support of a public "state-aided elementary school to an amount equalling those sub-"scriptions, provided it is less than 10/- a head for each child in "average attendance."

There are also proposals to enable schools to earn the grants without cramming and over-pressure; and suggestions that the inspectors should report separately on moral training, cleanliness, quietness, attention, obedience, accuracy of knowledge, general intelligence, &c.

If this be carried out we shall have the satisfaction of getting something out of our friends who object to subscribe "on principle," and at the same time continue to have the schools conducted on much the same lines as heretofore. Another recommendation of the Commission we commend to the notice of the Assessment Committee:— "Public elementary schools for which no rent is paid or received "should be exempted from local rates."
