The New Year.—According to our usual custom and time-honoured usage, we wish our readers a Happy New Year. May the coming year be rich in blessings to us all, and, growing wiser and better as we grow older, may we make good progress in the real journey of life which shall lead us to the gate of Heaven.

Our Schools.—H. M. Inspector's report has now come to hand. The amount earned is not quite so much as last year, but the average attendance, owing to sickness and other causes, was not so large as it was then. We give extracts from the Inspector's Report:

Bors' School.—"The boys have been less successful in their examination this year. Reading has improved in the upper standards, in the lower it is

still extremely monotonous; and there are several failures in spelling. Grammar and Geography are on the whole satisfactory, and the elder scholars recite their poetry pretty well. Singing exercises are creditable. Songs are sung with spirit, but less music in them than might e. Order was maintained successfully during the examination."

Girls' School.—"The girls have done their elementary work in general satisfactorily. The first standard have succeeded better than usual this year. The second are still rather weak in spelling. The upper standards spell much better. The paper work generally is very fairly good. Grammar is well answered. Repetition is rather ordinary. A clearer insight into the meanings of words met with in Reading, and more practice in mental arithmetic, would be desirable. The Needlework on view fully maintains its reputation. Most of the work for examination is very nicely done. Good order is kept. The Girls are very quiet to-day and give no trouble while under examination."

Infants' School.—"The first class write nicely, and are particularly bright and well acquainted with things about them, but they are backward in Reading, Spelling, and Arithmetic. The second and third classes write and read well, but are weak in figures. Singing is very good, both songs and exercises. Much of the Needlework on view is very creditable. Musical Drill is spirited as before. Marching is of the best to be seen anywhere. No copying should be allowed. In other respects the dis-

cipline is good."
