School Treats' Accounts.—We give this month the accounts, which present somewhat a sorry aspect. It is usual in most parishes that the wherewithal for treats for the School children in the Day and Sunday Schools should be provided by those who are able and kindly willing to contribute to the enjoyment of the little ones. This was

done in great measure in this parish as far as regards the S. James' Day Treat for many years by contributions in kind, cake, bread and butter, tea, &c. As the numbers of the Schools increased it was found inconvenient to depend upon an uncertain supply, and about 10 years ago contributors were asked to send money instead of kind. This plan has not on the whole been successful, and at times, e.g., this present year, has almost proved a failure. Although the Vicar has hitherto been able and willing to make up the deficit, yet it cannot be considered an altogether healthy state of affairs. The Vicar would be glad to receive any suggestions which might tend to establish the School Treats on a surer and more permanent basis. It will be seen that the amounts received this year bear only a small proportion to the amount which had to be expended. Should any of the parishioners have forgotten to send their contributions, it is not too late to do so now.


Our Schools.—The Examination in Drawing will be held by Lieut.-Col. Blunt, of the South Kensington Art Department. H.M. Inspector, in the Boys' School on Monday, October 17th. At last we are able to report that our teaching staff is made up to its full strength. Mr. Philps has been in the Boys' School some two months as Second Assistant Master, Miss Brown has just taken up the Second Assistantship in the Girls' School, and Miss Walters on the first of this month succeeds to the Infants' School, vacated by the resignation of Miss Edwards.

Postal Improvements.—We must congratulate the Inhabitants of Hampton Hill on the great improvement which has been effected in the delivery of our letters by the present new arrangement. Letters no longer are passed through the village en route to Hampton, from whence they had to be carried back before the distribution could commence. They are now sorted at the Hampton Hill Post Office, and delivered nearly an hour earlier than heretofore.

Temperance Work.—An endeavour to obtain funds, which are greatly needed, will be made by the Total Abstinence Society holding a Sale of Work in the Boys' School, on Saturday, October 29th. We invite all those who would assist in the good work of promoting Temperance to rally round us, and by their generous support to ensure its success. Music Licenses.—As it has been decided by the County Council for Middlesex that the Statute of George II which refers to the licensing of rooms for music and other entertainments, must henceforth be enforced in regard to Schools or any other rooms where village concerts are held, application for a license has been made, and will be granted, we hope, on November 4th. The effect will be that we shall be able to hold our Concerts, &c., in the School as heretofore.
