**Easter Services.**—There was a marked improvement in the number who attended the services on Good Friday. On Easter Day, too, there were large congregations morning and evening, and the number of Communicants higher than it has ever been. The Church, notwithstanding the lateness of the season, was very prettily decorated, and the services went well.

**Tableaux Vivants and Concert.**—An excellent entertainment was given in the Boys' School, on Wednesday, April 13th, in aid of the Funds of the Hampton Total Abstinence Society, and when all expenses are paid we hope there will be £4 or £5 to be handed over. Perhaps no higher compliment could have been paid to those who appeared in the "Tableaux" than the report actually taken home by one of the spectators, that "the magic lantern views were beautiful, quite like life." Some excellent songs and recitations filled up the intervals.

**Tower and Spire.**—Considerable progress has been made with the Subscription list, and the total amount promised or received is upwards of £1277. The Committee met on Friday, April 22nd. and received the completed plans. They have determined to invite tenders for carrying out the work, and these are to be sent in about the middle of May. It is of great importance that we should be enabled to show as large a sum total as possible by that date, as it will then have to be decided whether we begin at once or not.
