The Tower and Spire.—As the weather brightens, extensive views will be obtainable from the look-out in the spire, and on clear days points in several Counties will be distinguishable. It is possible, in favourable lights, to see some of the Oxfordshire hills beyond Henley, over the tower of Windsor Castle. On the North, Harrow can be

plainly seen; farther East the horizon being bounded by Hampstead and Highgate. Some of the Kentish hills are visible more to the southward, whilst due South, Boxhill is the most prominent object, with peeps of Sussex and Hants beyond.

There is an excellent staircase to about 85 feet from the ground, and beyond that a ladder to the middle look-out. It is hoped that the expense of this staircase may be covered by the charge which will be made for admission to the tower. Mr. Gostling, at the Vicarage, holds the keys, and will give admission for the fee of 6d. each person, on Wednesdays and Saturdays after 1 p.m., and on other week-days after 5.
