Free Education and School Subscriptions.—As this is the time that the School Committee is sending forth its emissaries to collect the means for carrying on our Schools, it may be well once more to explain that Free Education cannot be supplied without cost to someone. We are met sometimes with this argument: if Education has been made free, how is it that subscriptions are still required? We will endeavour to explain that Free Education, if it be intended to convey the idea that nobody now has to pay for Education, is a misnomer. If our readers will bear with us a few moments, we will endeavour to explain how this is. We will ask them to refer to last years' account, which may be found in the December issue of this Magazine, and there it will be found that the year's income amounted to £695. Of this sum,

£361 was received from the Education Department on the Inspector's Report for the previous year, £177 from children's pence, £70 from bequests, rents, and other sources, and £87 from Annual Subscriptions. Under the Free Education Act the Government still gives the old Grant, and also a new one, in lieu of the children's pence, but it leaves all the rest (about one quarter of the whole) to be provided for locally as heretofore. It must be provided by us, either Voluntarily or else by a Rate levied by a School Board. We wish to bring this very clearly before our subscribers, and to point out to them that in order to avoid a School Board, that there is, as much as ever, need of their voluntary effort. At the same time we would press upon them the fact that they are only asked to supply half-a-crown out of each pound that the school costs. If through failure to sustain our voluntary effort we are driven to a School Board, we shall not only lose in most part the real religious education now afforded to our children, but shall have to pay largely for all the increased cost of Board management. In addition to this, too, there must be a heavy expenditure for new buildings at the Hampton end of the School Board District, and towards this we shall have to pay our full share.

Crystal Palace Treat.—The annual excursion of the children of the Sunday School is fixed for Saturday, June 18th; and the Tea for the Infants and others who do not join the excursion, June 25th. The start will be made, as usual, from Fulwell by the 10.19 train, and the party is due to arrive back at 9. Any parents or others who may be anxious to join the excursion can obtain tickets at the Vicarage, at cost price, viz., adults, 3/4; children (under 15), 2s.

Cricket.—Our cricketers are now in full swing, and have a long list of engagements to fulfil, either away from home or on our own ground in Bushey Park. It is hoped that shortly leave will be obtained to erect a small pavilion on the ground for the convenience of those who play.

Temperance.—We are sorry to have to repeat our plea for funds for our Temperance work, but a considerable debt still hampers the work of our Total Abstinence Society. It is proposed later on in the season to hold a Sale of Work, which it is hoped will clear the debt and supply a fund available for the work for some time to come. It is hoped that all who can will assist the Society by endeavouring to make this effort a success.

Churchings.—We would call attention to the notice at the Church doors, that any woman desiring to be churched *before* any service should give notice before the Clergy leave the Vestry.

The Weather.—Prophetic announcements are common enough, but, unfortunately, they do not always prove correct. Anyhow, we can indulge in hope, We have had a prolonged winter and a cold though fine and sunny spring. Let us hope that our turn has come for an old-fashioned summer, such as we have not experienced since the Queen's weather of the Jubilee in 1887.
