MY DEAR FRIENDS,

Several of our winter organizations have made a beginning under more or less hopeful conditions, and with the continued willing support of our helpers and the parishioners generally, I feel sure that a successful season is before us. I would call your attention to the calendar on the previous page, and ask you to notice from day to day what is taking place and to make such use as you can of the opportunities afforded.

The first of the Winter Entertainments, which took place on the 15th ult., was satisfactory, both in the programme and in the attendance. The first part was exceedingly pleasing; and the second, which was occupied by Messrs. Cooper and Holberton, interested and mystified everybody. After the payment of expenses something like £6 remained for our local purposes.

The next Entertainment is fixed for Monday, November 12th, and is to consist of a Concert. The programme promises to be a very attractive one. Many of those who are to take part will be new to the parish. The room ought to be full.

The Lads' Brigade has made a new beginning, and if it goes on as it has begun it will be an excellent thing for our boys. There is now no charge for membership, but no boy can join unless he is a member of the Bible Class or the Sunday School. A member will be liable to dismissal for bad conduct, or for neglecting either the drills or his class without sufficient reason. It is proposed to have a Church Parade every two months, when the Company will march to Church in the afternoon in uniform. The acting officers are: Captain Isdell, Captain and Treasurer; Rev. H. Clarkson, Chaplain; and Serjeant Bremridge, Drill Instructor.

The Ladies' Working Party for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel has re-commenced with a large number of members. Any other ladies willing to assist will be welcomed at the meetings,

which are held at the Vicarage, every alternate Friday, at 2.30 p.m.

The Annual Examination of the Day Schools by H.M. Inspector will take place on the 22nd and 23rd (Thursday and Friday). May I ask all parents to try to make sure of their children being present? At the Drawing Examination last week, out of 203 boys on the register, only five were absent, and in each case a satisfactory reason was given for the absence. This was exceedingly good. If the same thing takes place throughout the School at the coming Examination the Managers will be more than satisfied.

Below will be found the first list of subscribers to the Schools. Mrs. FitzWygram, Mrs. Hubbard and Mrs. Hodge have most kindly done nearly all the collecting, and the result is very encouraging. The total amount received is several pounds better than last year, and there may yet be one or two further sums. The help that is given for this object is most valuable and most important. Our Church Schools form one of the glories of our Church. They are monuments of the zeal for the education of the people on the part of Church people. Churchmen have, with no niggard hand, put their hands in their pockets that the children of our land might be fitted for the battle of life, by being taught the elements of education, and, above all, by being grounded in the principles of the Christian Religion. In the list below, I am thankful to notice some who do not belong to our Church, which shows that there are others who heartily sympathize with this work, and are willing to aid it. The list is a long one and yet it might be longer, for the object naturally, in more ways than one, should appeal to every householder, but especially to everyone belonging to our Church. It is a source of great satisfaction to me that so many working men have assisted. However small the contribution may be, the moral support is most valuable.
