My DEAR FRIENDS,

The collections for the sufferers by the war in response to the Queen's Letter were exceedingly good, amounting to £56 2s. od. The liberality of this is the more to be noticed when it is remembered that several other sums had already been sent. Still in the light of the recent events at the seat of war there is no doubt that other urgent appeals must be made to us. Never in this century has our country had so much at stake as at the present moment. It is for every man, woman and child amongst us to brace themselves up to the highest point of heroic self-denial, so that we may be ready ungrudgingly to meet whatever awaits us or is required of us.

Members of the Congregation would notice the beautiful White Frontal for the Holy Table, which was used for the first time on Christmas Day. It is a magnificent piece of work, which deserves the closest inspection. It is given by a parishioner who wishes to be unnamed. The same donor has also given four new white and gold Alms Bags. A further gift of eight violet Alms Bags has also been made by Mr. Griffiths.

The annual Mothers' Supper took place on the 2nd inst., when about the usual number of members of the Mothers' Meetings were present, and some of their husbands. A large number of friends very kindly helped to attend to the guests and to take part in the Entertainment which followed. Helpers and visitors alike thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

The Men and Young Men attending Mrs. FitzWygram's Bible Classes were most kindly entertained by her, in her usual hospitable and generous manner, at Larkfield, on the evenings of the 9th and 18th respectively. Upwards of 50 were present on the two occasions, and they most warmly expressed their gratitude to their kind hostess.

The Monthly Service for Men only had again a larger attendance on the 14th ult. The next will be on Sunday, the 11th inst.

The Sunday School Prizes were distributed on the 13th ult. The attendance amongst the girls had very much improved, and the behaviour had been excellent. Miss Kidner distributed the prizes to the girls and infants, and Mr. Phillips those to the boys, in the absence of Mr. Joseph, who was unable to be present. After the prizes were given, the children were shewn a number of pictures of great British Battles and some scenes of incidents in the present war, by means of the new Lime-light Lantern, which the "Chair and Stage Trustees" have just purchased for the Church out of proceeds arising out of loan of chairs, &c.

The Day School Prize Distribution took place on the 26th ult. Special prizes were given for sewing by Mrs. Butler and Miss Hayes, and for Scripture by Mr. Evans.

The Winter Entertainment Committee are arranging an excellent Variety Entertainment for the 13th inst., which will be quite a new departure. There is to be conjuring and ventriloquism by an experienced performer, and a comedietta by Mr. and Mrs. Bourne, and an amusing shadow harlequinade under the management of Mr. Durham. A small squad of the Lads' Brigade will also give a short exhibition of musical drill. The Hall ought to be full.
