THE VICARAGE,

July 1st, 1900.

My dear Friends,

I mentioned last month that the School Managers had adopted plans for effecting great improvements in the sanitary arrangements of the Girls' and Infants' Schools. The work has now been commenced, and will be completed as The cost will be f_{160} , rapidly as possible. which is rather more than we expected. The Managers have discussed schemes for raising the money, but it was felt that the present moment is not an opportune one for this purpose, owing to the many efforts and frequent appeals for funds for the war sufferers, and so the matter was deferred. It was absolutely necessary to proceed with the work at once, and it was felt that whenever the appeal is made for the funds it will be liberally responded to.

The Excursion to Southsea did not draw so many outsiders as usual, and the consequence is that the proportionate cost is very much greater. The usual commission from the Railway Company could not be claimed. Last year this amounted to nearly $f_{.7}$. Last year the total cost of the excursion to the Treats' Fund was f_{11} 15s. 9d. This year it has been f_{21} . Of course this experience will make it necessary for us to considerably modify our plans another year. For the present it has practically absorbed all the funds we had in hand, and our great St. James' Day Festival is coming, when we usually provide tea and entertainment for 500 This involves an expenditure of at children. least £15. The offertories on St. James' Day will be for this, and any other help in money or provisions, or toys for prizes, will be thankfully received by the Day and Sunday School Teachers and myself. Apart from the cost of the excursion, the "outing" was a most satisfactory one. The conduct of the children was excellent, and the teachers did everything in their power to make the day a happy one for their scholars. The Lads' Brigade Band met us at the Station, and led the procession to the centre of the village, where we sang "God Save the Queen," and dispersed.

On St. James' Day, the 25th inst., all the children attending our Day and Sunday Schools will meet at the Schools at 2 p.m., and will march to the Church, headed by a Brass Band. After a short Service they will go to the Vicarage-Grounds for Tea and the usual games and fun. Members of the congregation, parents and friends, will be heartily welcomed in the grounds. The Festival Services will be as follows :—

7.30 a.m.-Holy Communion.

11 a.m.—Holy Communion and Address.

2.30 p.m.—Short Children's Service.

8.15 p.m.—Full Choral Service.

The Flower Show is fixed to take place on Wednesday, the 11th inst., in the field opposite the Orphanage. As the season has been an exceptionally good one for the growth of vegetables, a large number of exhibits is expected. It is hoped everybody who can will contribute to the success of the Show by exhibiting something, even if they are doubtful as to winning a prize. Others also can largely help by their presence. A large number of seats will be provided, and in addition to ordinary refreshments, there is to be a special tent for "Afternoon Tea."
