On the 19th, the Annual Social Evening of the Communicants' Association took place in the Vicarage Garden. There was a fair muster of members. An extremely pleasant evening was spent in games, music and singing. The Society is much indebted to Miss Barnard for the way in which she does the secretarial work throughout the year.

On the 18th, a Comic Cricket Match took place, which had been promoted on behalf of the Nurse Funds of Hampton and Hampton Hill. Amongst the chief movers in the matter were Mr. Morris and Mr. Rowland Moores. The financial results were most satisfactory, and the funds will benefit very largely in consequence. We are greatly indebted to all who took so much trouble to make the undertaking a success.

Our Annual St. James' Day Festival had all its usual brightness and real enjoyment for the children, in which the older ones shared. The day was the very hottest of this and many years, being 93 degrees in the shade, but the children did not seem to mind. There were a little over 500 children to tea, and at one time during the evening there were not less than 1200 of all ages, in the Vicarage Grounds. The Day and Sunday School Teachers helped "for all they were worth," which means a great deal at any

time, but especially on such a day, and as a consequence the children were thoroughly happy and gave no trouble. Miss Barnard, as usual, managed the tea, and produced no less than 100 gallons for the great quenchless thirst. Great help was also given by Messrs. Elsee, W. Singleton, Dowsett, Hallt, and many others. The services were fairly well attended, considering the heat of the day. The decorations were, as usual, extremely pleasing. A beautiful banner, presented by a member of the congregation, was used in the procession from the Schools for the first time.

During the next four weeks I expect to be enjoying a holiday at Nauheim, in Germany. It is a comfort to me to be able to leave the parish in the good hands of my colleague, Mr. Phillips.
