My dear Friends,

Amongst the parochial events of the past month I may mention the Day School Prize Distribution, which took place on the 7th ult. The Children received their rewards at the hands of Mrs. Griffiths. A vote of thanks was given to Mrs. Griffiths for distributing the prizes, which was acknowledged by Mr. Griffiths. I am glad to say that the attendance at the Day Schools shows a considerable increase upon what it was last year at this time.

An extremely good Winter Entertainment was given at the Victoria Hall, on Monday, the 18th There was a very large audience, and a ult. thoroughly appreciative one. Very great trouble had been taken to give an attractive performance, and in this our kind friends were entirely successful. Much of the expense of presenting "A Romance of ye Olden Time" was borne by those taking part in it, which increases our indebtedness to them.

No doubt some will prefer to give a donation rather than to contribute work, and both channels will be open. I hear already that many have something in hand for a Work Stall. Full particulars of the scheme will be given very shortly.

I am glad to say that two Missionary Meetings will be held during the month. One in connection with the Church Missionary Society, on Thursday, the 14th inst., in the Boys' School-room, when an address will be given by the Rev. F. Glanvill, Metropolitan Secretary of the Society, on "Missionary work among. Hindoos and Mahommedans in South India and Ceylon." The address will be illustrated by very beautiful magic lantern pictures. The admission will be
