Mr. Foster was re-elected Treasurer, and Mr. Edward Foster was elected Secretary. A warm vote of thanks was passed to Mr. Dudley Larcombe for his services as Secretary last year. They hope that by these low charges they will secure a full room on each occasion.

On Thursday, November 7th, there will be a Missionary Meeting in the Eastbank Mission Room, at 3 o'clock, when the Rev. A.
