My Dear Friends,

There are already indications that the fitful summer has well nigh left us, and with its departure our thoughts turn to the long evenings and to the various ways in which we are going to spend them. There will be studious evenings, and social evenings, and cosy evenings over the fire with a much loved book; and some will be thinking of providing useful or instructive, or pleasant evenings for others. The latter forms a very important part of parish work in these days, and our usual organizations are just about to wake up after their summer's slumber. The Band of Hope will begin on Monday, the 13th, at 6 p.m. I regret to say that the late valuable Secretary, Miss Short, finds that it will not be possible for her to continue her office this season. This will be a great loss. Very good work was done last winter, and several of our children gained prizes which they received at the hands of the Princess of Wales at the Crystal Palace.

The Communicants' Association will meet again on the 13th inst., at 8 p.m., in Church, and I hope the attendance will be good.

The S.P.G. Missionary Working Party will begin on Friday, the 17th, at the Vicarage, at 2.30 p.m. New members will be heartily welcomed. Probably there are many who are not able to come to **the** Meetings who might be willing to do work at home, and so assist the cause.

The Lads' Brigade will start afresh immediately.

Particulars of the Services for men will be fully announced.

The Annual Conversazione will, I hope, take place early in November.

The Winter Entertainment Committee will formulate their scheme in a few days.

I am glad to draw attention to the "Walton Lodge Choral Society," which is conducted by Miss Geraldine Cooke, and is held at Walton Lodge, St. James's Road. The Session commenced on September 29th, and the practices are every Monday night, at 8.30 p.m. The works selected for rehearsal are "The Messiah," "Gethsemane," and "John Gilpin." The fee for the Session is 5/-, and not 6/- as last year. Intending members are requested to communicate with Miss Geraldine Cooke.

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Most of the subscriptions for the Day Schools have been received. The School year closes at the end of this month. I shall be grateful if any who have not yet paid will very kindly send their subscriptions to Miss Barnard, or to me, within the next few days.

The Harvest Festival Services were, I think, exceptionally bright and hearty. The congregations, both on the Thursday and Sunday, were very large, and the collections amounted to upwards of f_{21} . Many beautiful gifts of fruit and flowers, &c., were received; amongst other things, a giant loaf from Mr. Churchwarden Storey, and another from Mr. Newton, while Mr. Howe sent the model of a sheaf of corn in bread, which was quite a work of art, and must have cost a great amount of patient la-Many willing fingers helped our Church bour. once more to look its very best, and the musical portion of the service gave evidence of the greatest care and pains. After the Service on Thursday evening, a beautiful timepiece and an illuminated address were presented to the Organist and Choir-Master, Mr. F. W. Dawkins, the occasion being the 25th anniversary of his appointment. The testimonial was subscribed for by the past and present members of the Choir and Clergy as a token of the respect in which Mr. Dawkins is held, and of his great care and attention to the duties of his office.

Two very acceptable gifts have just been made to the Church. A lady member of the congregation has given 20 hassocks for the free seats, and Mr. Griffiths has borne the cost of an improvement by which an additional pew is made available. It seems to be exceptionally well managed, and to afford great advantages to its members.
