The annual statement of accounts for the Nurse Fund will be found below. It is most desirable that this should not be the case, as the reserve fund might prove of great value in some unforeseen emergency, and it is to be hoped that additional subscribers will be found to help the fund. Subscriptions will be thankfully received by Mrs. Job or Mrs. Stutchbury. The Nurse's work is very much appreciated in the parish. During the past year she has made 1842 visits.

Our various organizations are buckling on their armour for the winter's campaign, and most of them will be at work during the month.

The Annual Meeting of the Adult Temperance Society is fixed for Friday, the 14th inst., at 8 p.m., in the Eastbank Mission Room, when it is hoped all members will be present. This will be followed by a Public Meeting on Tuesday, the 25th.

The Band of Hope will re-open on Monday, the 3rd inst., at 6 p.m., with the same staff of workers as before, and on Monday, the 24th, there is to be a United Service for all the Bands of Hope in the Deanery of Hampton, at St. James's Church, at 6.30 p.m.

The Lads' Brigade will re-commence on the 3rd inst., at 8.15 p.m., and will be largely under the care and direction of the Rev. E. S. Phillips and Mr. Carpenter. Lads wishing to join should be present at the fist drill.

The S.P.G. Missionary Working Party will commence a little later than usual as Mrs. Job will be from home during the month. The first meeting is fixed for Friday, November 11th, at 2.30 p.m., at the Vicarage. This Working Party has been carried on for many years, and a great deal of useful work has been done by it. The subscription is half-a-crown or upwards a year. New members will be welcomed.

The Annual Conversazione will, I hope, take place on Tuesday, the 8th of November. When I was in Palestine and Egypt I took a number of photographs, and many of these I hope to show with the magic lantern, and to describe them.
