My DEAR FRIENDS,

We are in the midst of Summer Treats just now, and they crowd one upon the other with great frequency. Fortunately the weather is most favourable so far. The Sunday School Excursion up the River to Windsor, on the 15th ult., was pleasant in every way. The boats were comfortable and well managed by civil and obliging men, and the changing scene on the banks formed a continuous panorama, pleasant and restful. We were fortunate enough to see Windsor decorated and dressed in its best for the Royal Marriage, and some of our party saw the bride and bridegroom as they drove to the station. Our company numbered 235. We arrived safe home at 9 p.m., feeling that we had had an ideal outing.

On the 28th ult. the Annual Festival of the Girls' Friendly Society, for our own and the surrounding parishes, took place in the Vicarage Grounds. Hampton, Hampton Court, Sunbury, and Hanworth were represented, and there were about 130 girls present. Prebendary Ram presided at the distribution of prizes, which were handed to the recipients by Mrs. Job. The Rev. W. Russell of Sunbury was present, and the Curate of Sunbury. Miss Hedges, the Secretary, made the arrangements. A number of lady associates were in charge of their members. The preacher at the Service was the Rev. Percival Smith, Vicar of Holy Trinity, Twickenham.

On Tuesday, July 4th, we hope to have our Annual Temperance Meeting in the Vicarage Garden. Full particulars have been furnished

to the members, and I hope they will all make a point of coming. A speaker from the parent society will be present, and we shall have some singing, coffee and light refreshments.

The Flower Show is fixed for Wednesday, the 12th inst., and it is to be in the Football Field in Wellington Road. The summer is so favourable for vegetables, fruit and flowers, that we ought to have a very good show indeed. I hope parishioners of all classes will support it, both by exhibiting and by their presence on the day. There are many prizes offered for ladies' exhibits, and these do much to make the Show attractive. May I suggest that ladies and everybody who has anything to show should apply to Mr. Hallt, the Secretary, Windmill Road, for a schedule, and decide upon their exhibits at once.

The Communicants' Association Tea is fixed for Tuesday, the 11th, at 5.30 p.m., at the Vicarage. All members are cordially invited.

The Annual Meeting of the Mothers' Union is to take place on Thursday, the 20th. There will be a short service at 3.30 p.m., and then we shall adjourn to the Vicarage Garden, when an address will be given, after which we shall have tea.

St. James's Day, Tuesday, the 25th, I hope everybody will keep in mind. It has always been observed as a great day in Hampton Hill. This year we cannot have all our doings on the same day, owing to the Day Schools not breaking up until the following Friday. So on St. James's Day we shall have Holy Communion at 7.30 and 11 a.m., and in the evening there will be a Choral Service at 8 p.m. I am glad to say that the Rev. Archibald Boyd-Carpenter, Chaplain

to the King, and Rector of St. Olave's, Hart Street, E.C., has kindly promised to preach. I hope we may have a large Congregation. The offertories will be for the Treats' Fund. The Friday following will be the Children's Day. The usual arrangements will be carried out. The Children will march through the Village to the Vicarage, there will be a short service in Church, and then there will be tea in the garden and such games as children love. We shall be very glad to see the parents of the children and members of the congregation at 4 p.m. The Festival Services will be continued on Sunday, the 30th. The Rural Dean, Prebendary Ram, has promised to preach in the morning. The offertories will be for the Electric Light Fund. We shall be grateful for the usual assistance in the decorations.

Many will feel great regret at the death of our valued parishioner, Mr. W. L. Milne. He was a Guardian of the Poor and a Charity Trustee, and was much respected by all who knew him. The fullest sympathy will be felt for his widow and family.
