The Church History Lectures during March have been very well attended. I hope it may be possible to keep up the Lectures with a greater degree of regularity another season. I believe it is most important that we should acquaint ourselves with the past history of our Church. I am sure that the more we know about her that more we shall love her.

The Missionary Meeting on the 20th inst. was not very largely attended. Unfortunately, the weather was very bad, but the speaker—Mr. Robinson—had an exceedingly good story to tell,

and some excellent pictures to show, of the work that is being done to reclaim people of wild and savage life, and bringing them under the influence of the gospel—a work which he showed us was being carried out with an astonishing amount of success.

I am sorry to say that during the month two

old and very much honoured members of the

congregation have been called to their rest. In the first week of March, Mrs. Kidner passed away at an advanced age. Nearly the whole of her life had been spent in this neighbourhood, but for the last two or three years she had lived at Walton. Her beautiful, gentle, patient character, and her many acts of generous charity, will long be remembered by her many friends. No one could long be in the presence of Mrs. Kidner without feeling the force of her strong Christian faith, and of her conscientious spirit. The effect of such a life is felt far beyond her own immediate circle.

Mrs. Salmon passed away on the last day of March, also at a great age. She was the widow of a clergyman who lies buried in our church-yard, and sister-in-law to Sir Noel Salmon. For many years she was a most active worker in the parish, always ready to help in every good cause, with her purse and her personal service, visiting the sick and poor, and giving her practical advice. Always kind and always sympathetic, we can ill afford to lose such earnest, practical, sensible, helpful Christians as these. They were blessings while they lived, and now heaven is richer and earth is poorer.

On the Thursday in Holy Week there will be a Preparation Service for the Easter Communion at 8 p.m. On Good Friday there will be services at 11 a.m. and 8 p.m., and meditations from 2 to 3 p.m. On Easter Sunday there will be celebrations of the Holy Communion at 6.45 a.m., 8 a.m., and after the mid-day service. I would remind you that it is a rule of the Church that all Christians should come to the Holy Communion on Easter Day, and I again most

cordially invite you to come in obedience to our Lord's command, Who said "This do in remembrance of Me." I shall be obliged if all who come will be kind enough to put their names in the basket in the porch at one of the services.

The next meeting for Missionary Intercession will be on Wednesday, April 25th, at 5.30, in the Mission Room.

I should like to express my warmest thanks to the many friends who have so kindly called at the Vicarage to make enquiries during the time I have been unwell.
