My DEAR FRIENDS

I am glad to say that several members of the congregation most kindly sent contributions to be added to the special offertories on the Sunday after St. James's Day for the debt in connection with the Church Expenses Fund. These contributions have increased the amount given from £17 7s. 10d. to £29 os. 4d., and if the ordinary offertories are maintained at their present improved level throughout the year, and no unexpected claim comes upon the fund, the deficit will entirely disappear. I find that many people do not understand the purposes for which this fund is responsible and therefore do not see the necessity for giving it any larger support. Of course in some cases the larger items in the above list were dealt with by special efforts, but the churchwardens feel that if it is fully known and understood how important the claims upon the fund are, there will be no lack of support, as all members of the congregation will wish that the fabric of the Church and the general comfort of the worshippers should be properly maintained and attended to.

The last of our Summer Treats took place on the 18th of August, when the "Infants," to the number of 80, came to the Vicarage garden for tea and games, with about twenty of the teachers.

I am sorry to say that the Sunday School is to lose the most excellent services of Miss Alice Mann, who for many years was a teacher, and for the last three years has been superintendent. The girls and the teachers are, I know, very sorry indeed that Miss Mann should find it necessary to retire. Nothing could have been more satisfactory than the way she has fulfilled the duties of the office. Personally, I am deeply grateful to her for the great assistance she has been to me. I am glad to say that Mrs. Wallace has most kindly consented to undertake the office of superintendent, and I am sure she can count upon the loyal support of all the teachers.

The District Nurse's visits for the last month were 260. There is very little sickness just now.

The Harvest Festival is fixed for St. Michael's Eve, Friday, the 28th. The offertory will be for the Sunday School. On St. Michael's Day there will be Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m. and 11 a.m. The preacher at 11 a.m. will be the Rev. Canon

Smith, from Sierra Leone, and the offertory will be for the Church Missionary Society. The Festival will be continued on the Sunday following when the offertories will be for the original fund for installing the electric light in the Church. Gifts of corn, fruit and flowers for the decorations will be thankfully received early on the morning of the 28th. Such a brilliant summer as this I do not think we have ever known. I believe the harvest is an abundant one and is being well gathered. We ought to be thankful.
