The Sunday School and Choir Excursion to Portsmouth took place on Wednesday the 12th ult. For such a season as this we were particularly fortunate in only having one shower of rain during the day. Our total numbers were 252. From all I heard the juveniles had not only a long but a thoroughly happy day.

The Annual Meeting of the Communicants' Guild is fixed for Monday, the 15th, and will be in the Vicarage Garden. We hope that by then the weather will have ceased to play such pranks with outdoor entertainments as has been its habit lately.

The Annual Meeting of the Mothers' Union will be arranged in the course of a few days. The members will have due notice. I am sorry to say that Mrs. Woolterton Reed, who has acted as Assistant Secretary, has found it necessary to resign owing to her removal from the parish. Her place has very kindly been taken by Mrs. Harrison of "Clovelly."

The Flower Show is fixed for Wednesday the roth inst., and is to be in the Football Field, Wellington Road. The Committee have made a great effort to keep this useful and pleasant local Society afloat, and they have had a good many discouragements. For no less than 37 years it has continued to do good work in the parishes of Hampton and Hampton Hill. It has helped to encourage allotment holders and cottagers; it has done much to promote a healthy emulation amongst gardeners, and it has awakened an interest in the cultivation of flowers amongst the children. It would be a misfortune if such a

Society should go to pieces through lack of public interest and support. I would appeal to those who have anything to show to enter it at once for competition. The ladies as a rule do so much to make a matter of this kind a success. I hope they will do their part on this occasion, even at some personal sacrifice to themselves, and I appeal to the public to show their interest by their presence at the Exhibition. The prizes are to be distributed by Mrs. Downes Norton at about 6.30 p.m.

Our Annual Dedication Festival is coming on. There will be a Choral Service on St. James's Eve, Wednesday, the 24th inst. The Bishop of Kensington had promised to preach, but he is unable to come at that time and will come instead for the Harvest Festival. His place will be taken by The Venerable Archdeacon of Middlesex. I hope we may have a large congregation.

On St. James's Day there will be Celebrations of Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m. and at 11 a.m. In the afternoon the Day and Sunday School Children will meet at the Schools at 2 p.m., and preceded by the Fortescue House Band, will march through the streets to the Church. It will add very much to the brightness of the scene and the enjoyment of the children, if the tradesmen of the village and others on the route will be kind enough to put out their flags and show their interest in the proceedings. After a short service, the children will proceed to the Vicarage Grounds for tea and the usual games. We shall be very glad to see the members of the congregation and the parents of the children in the course of the afternoon. The Offertories on the 24th and 25th will be for the Treats' Fund, and as we yet require about £15 for the Treats I hope we shall have generous help. Any contributions of toys, etc., for prizes, or cakes, etc., for the children's tea, will be thankfully received.
