My DEAR FRIENDS.

The Harvest Festival is fixed for Thursday the 10th inst. There will be celebrations of the Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m. and at 11 a.m. At the latter the address will be given by a missionary from Uganda, the Rev. H. Clayton, and the offertories at both these services will be for the Church Missionary Society. There will be a Choral Service at 8 p.m., when the preacher will be the Rev. P. Stocks, the new Vicar of Holy Trinity, Twickenham. The Festival will be continued on the following Sunday. There will be a celebration at 8 a.m., when the offertory will be for the Poor. 11 a.m. the preacher will be the Right Reverend the Bishop of Kensington; there will be a Children's Service at 3.15 p.m., and Evening Service at 7 p.m. The offertories will be for the Churchwardens' Improvement Fund, a first claim upon which will be the repainting and gilding of the faces of the Church clock, a most necessary piece of work. Gifts of corn, fruit, and flowers will be thankfully received at the Church on the previous Wednesday morning.

The usual organizations will re-commence during the month, after the summer's rest. The Communicants' Guild will meet in Church on Monday the 7th. The Annual Meeting of the Temperance Society, will be held on Tuesday the 8th, in the Eastbank Mission Room. The Sunday School Teachers' Classes will begin on Tuesday the 1st at 6 p.m. The Band of Hope will re-open on Monday the 14th at 6 p.m. The "Lend-a-Hand" Musical Society, under the fostering care of Mr. Phillips, will commence on Monday, the 14th, at 8 p.m., in the Boys' School. Intending

members should communicate with Mr. Phillips. The Lads' Brigade Drills will resume on Tuesday the 8th inst. at 8.15 p.m. These are all now fairly afloat and only need to be pressed into greater usefulness. I hope we may not only count upon our usual helpers, but that fresh recruits may come forward and give their assistance. The Missionary Working Party, which was so well supported last winter, will begin its meetings again at the Vicarage on Friday the 18th. The same helpers will have the charge of it as before, viz.: Mrs. Griffiths, Treasurer; Mrs. Handcock, Secretary; Miss Barnard, Superintendent of work, and Mrs. Job, President. The little Sale of last winter's work produced £11 14s. 1d. for the S.P.G. and the same amount for the C.M.S., for which I have received the warmest thanks from the respective secretaries. I hope we may have an access of new members this winter.

There will also be a portion of the evening set apart for reading and looking at illustrated papers, magazines, etc. Any gifts of magazines or papers, after use, will be thankfully received by Mr. Basev. The boys attending the classes will also have a Football Club all to themselves, for which ground is secured in the Park. The Dressmaking Class will be on Fridays from 4 30 to 6 p.m. A number of our young people ought to find these classes both useful and pleasant.
