My DEAR FRIENDS,

I think during this Lent we have had the most trying weather I ever remember, and the result has been a great deal of sickness everywhere. It is not to be wondered at that the attendances at the various Services have suffered in consequence. Happily now the measles have almost gone, and most of the other sick people are recovering.

The Confirmation at Hampton Wick on the ist inst., had one of the very worst days of the winter, the snow was thick on the ground, and then came the rain. The addresses by the Bishop of London were very impressive, and will be remembered by the Candidates and those who were present. The subject taken by the Bishop was "Joy in the Lord." There were 22 Candidates from this parish.

The lectures given by the Rev. W. D. Fanshaw, on Church History, were excellent, and the attendances were good. I am glad to say that Mr. Fanshaw has kindly promised to continue the course, with six more lectures, in the Autumn.

The Missionary Working Party has held its last meeting for work for this season. At the final meeting it was decided to hold the Annual Sale of Work on some day before St. James' Festival, as it was thought that on that day people's attention is taken up with other things and they forget the Sale. So Thursday, June 24th, was provisionally fixed upon, which I hope kind friends will please remember. A Meeting of the members will be held on Friday, May 28th, to arrange details. May I ask those who have taken Lent Savings' Envelopes to be kind enough to

return them before Easter ?

During Holy Week there will be Service each morning at 11 a.m., and a short Service and Address at 8 p.m. The Rev. Albert Kestin will give the Address on Wednesday

evening. I would remind Communicants that the Service on Thursday evening will be a preparation for the Easter Communion. On Good Friday the offertories will be for the Society for Rescue and Preventive Work, which is doing a great deal of good in the neighbourhood.

On Easter Day there will be an extra Celebration of the Holy Communion, which will have the effect of shortening the time for waiting at all the Services. There will be Celebrations at 6, 7 and 8 a.m. and after the morning Service. Those who attend are asked to be kind enough to put their names in the basket in the porch. This is a great convenience to me, and I shall be grateful if it is fully observed. I am glad to say that we shall have the help of two extra Clergymen, the Rev. J. Harrison, and the Rev. Albert Gifts of flowers, and the loan of Kestin. plants for the decorations will be most acceptable, and we shall be glad if they may be at the Church by 10 o'clock on the Saturday morning.

The Vestry Meeting will take place in Easter Week. I hope all the Sidesmen will be present, and any members of the congregation who can come.
