MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The past month has been one of many parochial festivities, and now most of them are over for this season. The weather has been deplorable, and yet for the most part we have been fortunate, and none of our gatherings have suffered through the rain. On the 7th ult. the G.F.S. Annual Festival for the parishes in the neighbourhood was held here. Contingents came from Hampton, Sunbury and Hanworth. Tea was provided in a tent in the Vicarage garden; after tea there was a distribution of prizes and rewards, and this was followed by an Exhibition of Cookery in the Church Room, for which prizes were given and the products sold. Upwards of 200 girls were present. The proceedings were concluded by a Service in Church. The next day the members of the Communicants' Guild held their Annual Meeting in the Vicarage garden. After tea we adjourned to the Church Room. The accounts showed that there was £7 4s. 7d., in hand towards the new stained glass window in the Church, and a further balance of £2 18s. 3d. The following sums were voted, *i.e.*: £1 1s. 0d. for the Nurse Fund; 10s. for the S.P.G.; and 10s. for the C.M.S. A pleasant little Entertainment followed, to which Miss Gardner largely contributed by means of an excellent phonograph. The following also kindly assisted, Rev. E. S. Phillips, Miss Porter, Messrs. Kelsey, A. Newman, Reynolds, Spencer and Caton.

The Flower Show took place at the Manor House Grounds, Hampton, on Wednesday, the 14th ult., and notwithstanding the wet season the Show was excellent. The attendance was good, and after the payment of all expenses a balance was left of 27s. The prizes were distributed by Mrs. Tyndale. Mr. Elsee, the President, is to be congratulated on the result, which was largely contributed to by the efforts of the Ladies' Committee and the Sports' Committee.

On Thursday, the 15th ult., the Annual Meeting of the Mothers' Union was held in the Vicarage grounds. This was preceded by a short Service in Church. Nearly a hundred members were present. An address of a most earnest and instructive character was given in the garden by Mrs. Twining, of St. Stéphen's Vicarage, Westminster.

The Annual Meeting of the Temperance Society took place on Thursday, the 22nd, in the Vicarage garden, when 86 were present. The Rev. L. P. Currie, the Secretary of the C.E.T.S., attended and spoke with great earnestness of the work of the Society, with special reference to the "Forward Movement," which is to take place in the Autumn. Mr. Phillips proposed, and Mr. Hallam seconded, a vote of thanks to Mr. Currie for his address. Mrs. Wallace, Mrs. Griffiths, Mrs. Singleton, Miss E. Barton, Mrs. and Miss Carpenter, and others managed the refreshments, all of which were given, so that the payments for tickets were all profit.

Members of the congregation will have noticed the very pleasing addition of a new curtain which has been placed on the West wall of the Church. The curtain is the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Downes Norton, of Laurel Dene, and it has added greatly to the beauty of the Church, and given finish and completeness to that part of it.

I must not close without a brief reference to the great trouble that has come upon the family of Mr. Kestin, who has long been a valued helper in the Church. Mr. Kestin's eldest son went out to South America a year ago, and there contracted typhoid fever; after a long illness he returned home a few weeks ago completely shattered in health, and passed away somewhat suddenly on Monday last. He has left a young wife, for whom, and for the father and mother, very great sympathy will be felt.
