The movement is strongly supported by our Bishop, and it is general all over the country. The aim is to check excess, and the terrible loss and ruin to body and soul which excess causes. We want the sympathy and help of all Church people, and of others as well. Our object is to teach those who do not know the curse of excess. On Monday, Nov. 15th, there will be a general Public Meeting in Twickenham Town Hall, in connection with the

"Forward Movement," and I hope many will go from this parish.

There will be light refreshments at 7 p.m., to be followed by an Entertainment, which will consist of music, songs, etc., and I hope to give a little "talk" about my recent holiday in the Italian Lakes, and to show some lantern pictures taken on that occasion. Tickets may be obtained from the District Visitors. The proceeds will be partly for the Working Men's Club and partly for the Nurse Fund.

The next service for the members of the Mothers' Union will be on Friday, the 19th, at 3 p.m. Will members please remember this?

On Sunday, the 21st inst., the sermons at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. will be preached by the Rev. Albert C. Kestin, and the sum contributed in the offertories over the usual expenses will be given to the Church of England Scripture Readers' Society, of which Mr. Kestin is the Secretary. The society exists for the purpose of supplying lay readers to assist the clergy in large and poor parishes, and it is at the present time sorely in need of funds.

On Advent Sunday, Nov. 28th, sermons will be preached and collections taken for Foreign Missions (S.P.G.) The preacher at 11 a.m. will be the Rev. Fairfax Scott, the new Vicar of Hanworth, who has for some years been acting as assistant to Bishop Montgomery, the Secretary of the Society.
