The congregations at the **Harvest Festival** were very good; the decorations left little to be desired; the collections were very fair and the services bright. The sermon by the Rev. W. J. Latham was most impressive. I should like to say how grateful we are to all who sent bread, fruit, corn and flowers for the decorations, and to all who helped in the arrangement.

On October 3rd, **Men's Club and Institute** was re-opened. An excellent Committee and Officers were appointed and a good number of members joined. Some changes were made in the rules, and I am glad to say there is every prospect of coming prosperity for the Club.

The **Choral Society** has opened the Session with very good numbers, under the Conductorship of Mr. Ridgway. The practices are every Monday evening in the Boys' Schoolroom.

The **C. E. Men's Society** had a Meeting on the 25th, when an excellent lecture on the "Reformation" was given by the Rev. W. D. Fanshawe. On the 22nd of this month, Mr. W. T. Lowdell will read a paper on "Church Architecture," with lantern illustrations. Any men who are interested in the subject will be welcome. The next Men's Service will be on Sunday the 27th inst.

The **Temperance Crusaders** had their opening meeting on October 18th. There was a fair attendance and several new members were admitted.

A Meeting in connection with the **B. & F. Bible Society** was held in the Church Room, on the 25th. A most interesting address was given by the Rev. W. G. Jones. The collection amounted to £1 15s. 6d.

A New Stained Glass Window has been put in the west end of the Church by the **Communicant's Guild**, and it will be dedicated at

the next Guild Service on Monday the 7th inst.

I am asked to mention that a great Meeting will be held in the Queen's Hall, Langham Place, on Tuesday the 8th inst., in connection with the Colonial and Continental Church Society. Cinematograph pictures will be shown illustrating recent developments in Canadian Emigration.

The Annual Meeting of the **C. E. Temperance Society**, for passing the Accounts and for the Election of Officers, will be held in the Church Room, on Thursday the 10th inst., at 8 p.m.

On Advent Sunday, the 27th inst., Missionary Sermons will be preached and the offertories will be for the S.P.G.

The **Annual Conversazione** is fixed for Tuesday the 29th inst. The doors will be opened at 7 p.m. There will be the usual light refreshments, followed by an Entertainment, the particulars of which will be announced in a few days. The proceeds will be given to the Curate's Fund and the Nurse Fund. Tickets may be had from the District Visitors at the usual prices.

There will be a Service of Prayer for Foreign Missions, on St. Andrew's Day, the 30th inst. The Bishop of London has written a long letter in which he strongly appeals to Church people to come to this service and take a greater interest in Missions. "We have yet to learn," he says, "what may be the effect upon the whole Missionary Work of the Church if we work with God in this way. The effect may be in time nothing short of miraculous."

There will be a **Mothers' Union** Service on Tuesday afternoon, the 22nd inst., at 3 p.m., to which I hope all members will come.
