MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The usual Summer Festivities have been crowding one upon another during the last month. We had the Annual Meeting and Tea for our COMMUNICANTS' GUILD on the 11th ult., in the Vicarage Garden. The numbers were rather larger than usual. I was able to report that during the past year the Guild had put a small stained glass window in the Church at cost of £20. It had also made grants to the Nurse Fund, the S.P.G. and the C.M.S., and had made contributions for sending two people to convalescent homes.

The TEMPERANCE SOCIETY had its Annual Meeting on the 17th, in the Church Room. The report read by the Secretary, Mr. Jordan, showed that there had been an increase of seven members during the year. An impressive address was given by Mr. Scott France, and a brief entertainment, arranged by Mr. Phillips, was given.

The Annual Meeting of the MOTHERS' UNION took place on the 20th. After Service in Church there was an adjournment to the Vicarage Garden, when a most interesting address was given by Mrs. Halliday, who had recently visited New Zealand and Australia. The address was followed by tea. The numbers present were nearly one hundred.

On the same afternoon the Annual Festival of the G.F.S. was held at Hampton, when a contingent from our parish, under the care of Miss Brewer, was present. The chief event of the month for us was the St. James's Festival, which was observed under conditions of intense heat. The Church was as prettily decorated as usual, and we are very much indebted to all who helped and who gave flowers. On the 25th (St. James's Day) we had a fair number of communicants in the morning, and a good congregation in the evening, when the preacher was the Rev. W. W. Clarke, of Holy Trinity, Twickenham. On the following Friday we had our usual Garden Féte. There was the procession from the schools through the village, and the service in the Church, then the tea and games in the Vicarage Field. I am sorry to say that a few children had to be kept away because of the measles. Nothing seemed to give so much delight to the children as Punch & Judy, which was exceptionally good. Great interest was taken in the drilling under the care of Miss Hilda Davies, Mrs. Creane, Mr. Phillips and Mr. Basey. We are very much indebted to all the many helpers, who were unflagging in their efforts. Especially I ought to mention Miss Barnard, who made the tea, and Messrs. Singleton, who lent timber and provided labour. I also wish to thank all who lent cans and jugs, and all who gave toys, sweets and cake. The Festival Services were continued on Sunday, the 30th, when the Choir, under the care of our new organist, showed that they had spared no pains to make the services as reverent and devotional as possible. The Recital given by

Mr. Gilberthorpe, assisted by Master Fenton Phillips, in the evening, was very attractive, and nearly all the congregation stayed until the end.

The Rev. E. S. Phillips will be away for his holidays for this month.

The Annual Meeting of the Subscribers to the Nurse Fund will be held in the Church Room on Wednesday morning, the 9th inst., at 11.15 a.m. All who are interested are invited to be present. The statement of accounts will be found below.
