I am asked to mention that there will be a great KINOMATOGRAPH EXHIBITION of Chinese Missionary Work in the Twickenham Town Hall, on November 6th, and to ask our friends to keep the day free so that they can attend.

After a brilliant Summer we have had we shall all feel that there is greater cause than ever why we should all take the greatest interest in the

Harvest Thanksgiving. The Harvest has been, I believe, an abundant one, and the corn has been well gathered. Then, I think too, that there is great cause for gratitude, in the fact that the strike so soon came to an end. It would have meant untold suffering all over the country if it had continued, and from that we have been most happily spared. The HARVEST FESTIVAL is fixed for the Eve of St. Michael and All Angels' Day. There will be a full Choral Service at 8 p.m., when the preacher will be the Rev. Maximilian Binney, M.A., the Vicar of Richmond, and the offertory will be for the Day Schools. The next day, Friday, September 29th, there will be Celebrations of the Holy Communion at 7.30 and 11 a.m. The preacher at 11 a.m. will be the Rev. H. B. Liddell, Missionary from Persia, and the offertories at both services will be for the Church Missionary Society. The Thanksgiving Services will be continued on Sunday, October 1st, when the offertories will be for the Curate's Fund, and I want to ask for larger gifts than usual, because this fund has suffered from a series of extremely hot Sundays, and in consequence, small congregations, and it is now considerably behind. Gifts of corn, fruit, flowers and bread will be thankfully received early on Thursday morning, the 28th inst., and we shall be grateful for the assistance of all those who usually help in the decorations. I shall be glad if the District Visitors will kindly attend in the Vestry on the following Monday morning to assist in the distribution of the bread and fruit.
