THE DAY SCHOOLS.

Report of the Inspectors in Religious Knowledge.
BOYS' DEPARTMENT.

"The School is again excellent. Div. i—The aim of the work and the attitude of the boys are quite praise worthy—there has been practical as well as spiritual teaching. The importance and scope of the Acts are not realised enough. Div. ii—All subjects are successfully taught and known. Div. iii, show earnest, thorough and effective teaching, the answering is general and keen. Some excellent work is shown in Div. iv. The syllabus is rather out of balance—too much is taken in the Old Testament; the explanation of Catechism is not always correct, whereas accuracy is a characteristic of the New Testament subject."

GIRLS' DEPARTMENT.

"The school is again thoroughly excellent. Skilled and influential work is evident in Div. i., the girls have gained much knowledge of practical value, and on all subjects there was pleasing and intelligent answering. Attractive teaching is given in Div. ii., and the knowledge shown by the children is definite and sensible. In Div. iii. the Catechism explanation might be more practical, but pains are evident; very careful instruction has been given on the Scripture subjects. In Div. iv., there was eager and correct answering on Holy Scripture, and helpful lessons have been given on the Catechism."
