The PROVIDENT CLUB money was paid out on the 13th ult. £492 17s. 3d. was received by the District Visitors during the year; £52 9s. 8d. had been withdrawn in the course of the year, and the balance, £440 7s. 6d., with £16 0s. 10d., added for interest, was paid to the depositors, who, I have no doubt, were very grateful to the District Visitors for the great trouble they took in the matter.

The DISTRICT NURSE goes on with her good work to the great satisfaction of everybody concerned. We have lost some subscriptions owing to removals, and we should be very glad of new ones. A grand Concert is being arranged for the 16th February, and we have a good Committee at

work upon it. I am very glad to say that Mr. Chester, who is now so well known amongst us, has very kindly promised to come without charge if he should be free, and we shall have several other good performers. I hope we shall have a large audience. The object deserves it, and the programme ought to secure it.

On Friday, the 12th inst., there will be a beautiful MAGIC LANTERN EXHIBITION of "Sunrise Land," that is Japan. The explanation will be given by the Rev. J. P. Hobson, M.A., the Secretary of the Religious Tract Society. The admission will be free to adults, children will be admitted at one penny. There will be a collection at the close for the Society.
