There will be a Choral Service at 8.15 p.m., when we hope all who can will be present. Do not forget that this is to be the Jubilee Service of our Church. The Bishop of Kensington will preach, and I hope he will also dedicate the memorial windows to Mrs. FitzWvgram and the Rev. the Hon. H. Bligh. The offertories throughout the day will be for the Treats' Fund.
