Mr. Basey will have charge of the Drilling, and Miss Blanchard of the Syllabus Class. The preliminary meeting will be held in the Boys' Schoolroom, on Monday, the 6th, at 5.45 p.m.

The LADS' BRIGADE Headquarter's Staff for London have fixed Sunday, the 5th, as "Brigade Sunday," and all past and present members who have been confirmed are invited to attend the Holy Communion, in uniform, at 8 a.m.
