MY DEAR PEOPLE,

The war has claimed its first victim from our Parish by the death of R. Doughty, of Wolsey Road, who was formerly reported as "missing," but has now been reported "dead." To his widow and children we tender our deepest sympathy. We are all also sorry to hear that Mr. and Mrs. Morris, of Rothes, have lost a grandson, in action, Lieut. Hastings Medhurst, a young officer of very great promise.

The Annual Meeting of our branch of the C.E.T.S. was held on Tuesday, October 13th, when our excellent Secretary—Mr. Jordan—presented his report, extracts from which, together with the balance sheet, will be found elsewhere. Mr. Chapple, of Hampton Wick, gave an interesting address.

The Syllabus for the Winter's Session of the C.E.M.S will be found in this month's Magazine. I hope that members will make an effort to attend these meetings, and specially to be psesent at the Corporate Communions.

I am very delighted at the quick and generous response which has been made to the appeal on behalf of the Belgian Refugees. I suppose we shall never know how much this nation and France owe to the brave action of Belgium at the beginning of the war, and I am glad that we are doing our best for these homeless people. We have promises amounting to £250; a house has been placed at the disposal of the Committee by Mr. Street, and a large number of gifts have been forthcoming of furniture, &c. I hope to be able to report next month that we have given a home and a warm welcome to about 12 Belgians.

I am told that the members of the C.L.B. have collected about one ton of waste paper, which has been sold for the Prince of Wales' Fund, and that altogether more than £1000 has been realised throughout the country by this means.

The Teachers in the day schools are contributing the sum of £1 8s. 3d. monthly to the "Local Aid Fund" during the continuance of the war. I hope that the Concert kindly organized by Dr. and Mrs. Doll, and which takes place in the Town Hall, Twickenham, on November 10th, will be well supported; the proceeds are for the "Local Aid Fund."

It is with great regret that I announce the removal from the Parish of Mr. and Mrs. Douty. of St. James' Avenue. Mr- Douty was the Treasurer of the Assistant Clergy Fund, and did good work on its behalf. They carry with them our best wishes.

I am glad to report that Mrs. Gascoyne and Miss Jakeman have joined our band of District Visitors.

While we are all anxious to do our best for those suffering from the effects of the war, we must not allow other calls to be neglected. The Ladies' Missionary Working Party will be resumed at the Vicarage, on Friday, November 6th, at 2.30, when Mrs. Coad Pryor will welcome all those who are, or desire to become, members.

The next Communicants' Guild Service will take place on Monday, November 2nd, at 8 p.m.
