On Tuesday, 13th April, the Church Lads' Brigade had the Annual Distribution of medals, bars, and N.C.O.s' good conduct stripes. The lads were inspected by Major the Rev. E. D. Merritt, who was very pleased with the smart turn-out and steadiness of both the senior Brigade and the recently-formed Junior Corps. The Silver Cup, given by Miss Butler for the smartest squad, was won by the band squad under Sergeant Wm. Finer.

On Saturday, 17th April, members of the Junior and Senior Bands of Hope entered for the Rural Deanery Competition, and won with good margins both the Junior and Senior Band of Hope Shields. This was the first occasion on which we have turned out a Senior Lads' Drill Squad.

On Tuesday, 27th April, the C.E.T.S. Entertainment in the Schools was well attended, and an excellent and inspiring address was given by Dr. Leeson.

On Wednesday, 12th May, at 8 p.m., there will be a Concert in the Boys' School in aid of the funds of the Band of Hope. It is sincerely hoped that a good sum may be realised to carry on this increasingly important work of temperance among our young people.

The Easter Vestry Meeting was held on Monday, 26th April, in the Church Room, having been adjourned from the 19th April, in consequence of the sudden illness of the Vicar, who was still unable to attend. Mr. C. H. Carpenter occupied the Chair.

The Churchwardens' report was as follows :

The parochial activities of the past year have been much influenced by the outbreak last August

of the great European War, in which this country is engaged, and the opportunity has thereby arisen for viewing our relations to each other in an even closer perspective, which it is hoped will lead to mutual benefit and help.

An United Service, in which the non-conforming bodies in the Parish joined, was held on the 3rd January, the day set apart for National Intercession.

In the early part of the year steps were taken to acquire, at a low price, a site for a Parish Hall, and it had been intended to call a Meeting in the Autumn to consider the question of its erection, but the outbreak of war called for a postponement of the matter.

A window to the memory of Mrs. Butler, an old resident, and Lieut. Colonel Butler, has been placed in the north aisle. Mrs. Musgrave has presented a new set of offertory bags, and Mrs. Stutchbury has given new book-markers for the lectern, and the best thanks of the congregation are due to them.

We have to record, with deep regret, the death of Mr. G. H. Cremer, a sidesman of St. James' for twenty-six years, and Mr. W. C. B. Hall, a late resident in the parish, who was for many years Churchwarden.
