I was glad to see so many people at the Memorial Service for those who have fallen in the War, which was held on Wednesday, September 22nd. The names now number 13, and the list will be found in this month's magazine.

I am sorry that we shall soon be losing the services of Mr. Goldie. He has been offered, and has accepted, the Curacy of St. Luke's, Redcliffe Square, and he will probably be leaving us towards the end of October. He will carry with him our good wishes and prayers for his future work. May I ask you to pray that a successor may be sent to us who will carry on the good work which Mr. Goldie has done for more than two years?

The Churchwardens would be glad of any subscriptions to the Treats' Fund. There is a deficit of £3 or more, which they are anxious to wipe out.

The Kingston Board of Guardians have taken 'Fairlight' for one of their "Scattered Homes," and in a few days there will be forty boys residing there. These will come to our Schools, and I very earnestly ask for two or three volunteers for Teachers in the Sunday School. I hope some of you who read these lines will feel called to undertake this very important part in the work of the Church.

The Chair will be taken by the BISHOP OF COLCHESTER, and an Address will also be given by the Rev. E. N. SHARPE, Rector of Holy Trinity, Marylebone. The Prizes and Certificates gained in the recent examination of Sunday School Teachers, and also the Certificates gained by the Students of St. Christopher's College, Blackheath, who have completed their course of training, will be distributed on this occasion. The Meeting is held at this time in the hope that it may serve as a useful stimulus at the outset of the autumn's work in the Schools and the Associations.

In this year of special difficulty and danger it is needless to say that the Church Abroad is in a very precarious position, and needs the sustaining power of united prayer as urgently to-day as in any period of her history.
