We all join in congratulating our kind neighbours, the Rev. and Mrs. Leslie Morris, on their Golden Wedding, which they celebrated on June 6th.

The Sunday School children hope to go to Windsor in August. Please be generous to the collectors for the "Treats" Fund.

The "All Day" Intercessions for the War will be held on July 28th. I am so glad to find that this day, so set apart, is being used by many of our people.

Literature concerning the "National Mission" will be placed in the Church during the coming month. I ask for it your prayerful consideration.

Parish Notices.

Teddington War Hospital Supply Depot.

The following is a list of the "Surgical requisites" which have been made at the Depot, Lincoln House, Fairfax Road, during the last six months: 3210 swabs; 950 flat swabs; 889 roller bandages; 666 many-tails; 92 handkerchiefs; 46 eye protectors; 13 pairs of slippers; 8 chin bandages; 3 pillows; 2 pairs of bed socks. Total—5879.

From the beginning of January till the end of May, the average attendance each day was twenty. The demand for bandages, etc., is greater than ever, and more workers and funds are needed if the regular supply of "Surgical requisites" is to be kept up. The Depot is open on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, from 10—1 p.m., and 2—4.30 p.m. For further particulars please apply to the Hon. Secretary, Briarwood, Teddington.

S. Catherine's Home.

A Sale of Work and Second-hand Clothing, etc., will be held at the above Home, 139, Church Road, Teddington, on Thursday, July 13th, from 3 o'clock. Entrance, 3 to 5 o'clock, 3d.; after 5 o'clock, 2d. Proceeds in aid of the Home.

Women's Sewing Association.

The above Association, which was formed in August, 1914 (with Mrs. Stutchbury as President, and Miss Butler as Secretary) for providing clothing for wounded soldiers, has recently been dissolved. Its work was energetically carried on in the early days of the war, especially during the winter of 1914-15, and for some months afterwards, and a very large number of garments were made and sent, together with a quantity of spare clothing (overcoats, dressing gowns, &c.) to the R.A.M.C. Hospital at Southampton Docks, and other Institutions, including the Hampton Cottage Hospital. Of late, owing mainly to the conflicting claims of other war-relief Institutions, the work has gradually lost support, and as another organ-

ization with similar objects, and under Government control ("Comforts for Soldiers") has just been started. the earlier one has been closed, and the small cash balance remaining handed over to Mrs. Norton, of Laurel Dene, who presides over its Hampton Hill Branch. Grateful thanks are due to the many kindly helpers, in work and money, of all classes, but they are too numerous to name here, and it would be invidious to select. It is right to mention, nevertheless, that Mr. Bowden, of High Street, of whom much of the flannel was bought, contributed largely to the funds, and that the children of the Church Schools, under the supervision of the teachers, knitted most of the socks. An abstract of the accounts is appended.
