A notice of Capt. Ernest Job appears elsewhere, I need only say here how much we all feel for your late Vicar and Mrs. Job in the loss which they have sustained by their son's death, and for Mrs. Ernest Job and her little boy.

News has recently reached the Parish of the death in action of Bugler Gamgee, elder boy of Mr. and Mrs. Gamgee of Cross Street. A former member of the C.L.B., he was much loved and will be greatly missed, we all share in Mr. and Mrs. Gamgee's sorrow.

I am glad that the "Church Army Flag Day" was such a success. The sum of £28 10s. 0d. has been sent to Prebendary Carlisle—thanks to those who organized and helped in many ways.

Mrs. Shelbourne tells me that £21 10s. 0d. was the result of the Dr. Barnado Sale at Eton Lodge, this too is excellent. Perhaps in this war time people are spending less on luxuries and thus have more to contribute to charitable objects.

During August the Children's Services will be resumed at 3 p.m. I am afraid this is against the Doctor's orders, but so many of the School Teachers are away, that I feel it is necessary to have the Service.

The Sunday School Children hope to go to Windsor on August 16th. The cost of everything has increased this year and I hope the subscriptions to the Treats' Fund will increase in proportion!

A good many people have signed the Petition for the closing of Public Houses, &c., during the period of the War and six months afterwards. The necessity for such a step is deplorably evident and I greatly hope that the Government will be strong enough to take it.

The C.E.T.S. had a good gathering in the Vicarage field on July 19th. Mr. Jordan read a cheering annual report, and a very pleasant and profitable evening was spent.

The Church Lads' Brigade Institute, secured mainly by the energy and generosity of Miss Butler, is now firmly established in the old Reading Room. Windmill Road, and is open five nights a week to members of the C.L.B. Any assistance, and this may be rendered in many ways, will be gladly welcomed by Miss Butler and Mr. Basey.

ERNEST DALZEL JOB, Captain in the Machine Gun Corps, who was killed in action in France in the "Great Push" last month was a general favourite in Hampton Hill, where he spent so many years of his life at the Vicarage with his father and mother, and our heartfelt sympathy goes out to Rev. C. R. and Mrs. Job, as well as to his sorrowing widow, who was also a resident of the parish for so many years. Ernest Job was a typical Englishman. Sturdy in action and character he was successively a helper in our Sunday School and Captain of our Company of the Church Lads' Brigade, and retained (on leaving the parish) the rank of Paymaster of the Company. He was also to the fore in sports and games. and was a prominent member of the Teddington Hockey Club. In his military career, as a member of the well-known Artists' Corps, he represented the corps on several occasions in the bayonet combats at the Naval Military Tournament. On the outbreak of War he re-joined his old Corps. and after commanding the scout section of one of the battalions, entered the Machine Gun Corps in which he met with his death. He was also a sidesman of St. James' Church, and formerly a member of the Choir.
