Parish Dews.

The Vicar will be away, under doctor's orders, for a complete rest and freedom from all correspondence until the middle of May.

He hopes to return and take up his duties on or before Tuesday, May 15th, from that date the daily services will be resumed as usual, except that Thursday, the 17th, being Ascension Day, there will be Evensong and Sermon at 8 on that day instead of Wednesday.

EASTER VESTRY.—The Easter Vestry was held on Friday, April 13th, in the Church Room, the Vicar presiding. The various Church accounts were submitted and passed subject to audit, Mr. C. H. Carpenter was re-nominated as Vicar's Warden, and Mr. C. H. Oatway re-elected as People's Warden. Sidesmen were elected, and the names of Messrs. J. Roberts, W. H. Tandy and W. Tozer added to the list. The Vicar cordially thanked the various Church workers for their services during the past year. (The accounts will appear in the next issue.)

Churchyard.—The offertories at all the services on Whitsun-day, May 27th, will be on behalf of the Churchyard Fund. A very special appeal is made that the collections will be generous, as the object is worthy of hearty support.

Church Lads' Brigade.—On Tuesday, April 17th, there was a drill display in the Drill Hall, before a good attendance of parents and friends.

Church of England Men's Society.—On Tuesday, April 24th, in the Church Room, Mr.G.B. Scott, C.I.E., of Teddington, gave a most interesting address on India. Speaking first of the geography of the country, he described the wonderful formation of the Himalaya mountains by a moving sea of clay which was "held up" and hardened.

Then he dealt with India's religions, her numerous races and tribes, their languages and characteristics, passing on to her early history and civilization 2000 years before Christ. We sincerely hope that Mr. Scott, who has passed most of his life in India, and speaks from a deep and intimate knowledge of the country, will find time to give us another address next season.

THE SCHOOLS.—The boys during April saved enough of their own pocket money to purchase 147 new-laid eggs to send to the wounded soldiers at Hampton Court Hospital. Lady Bedford has sent a card to the School thanking the scholars for their generous gift.

REV. S. N. WATERHOUSE.—We record the burial of Samuel Neil Waterhouse, who passed away full of years and honour at his residence in Teddington. He was a well-known figure in the district, and was for many years pastor of the Congregational Church in Hampton Hill, a position which advancing years compelled him to vacate some years back.

MISSIONARY WORKING PARTY.—The meetings are now discontinued till after the summer. They have been held fortnightly since Christmas, and best thanks are due to all those who have so kindly invited the members to meet at their houses.
