PAROCHIAL MISSIONARY CAMPAIGN.

A Diocesan Missionary Service will be held in the Church of St. Martin-in-the-Fields (by the kind permission of the Vicar), on Tuesday, October 30th, at 6 p.m. The Sermon will be preached by the Right Rev. F. Goldsmith, D.D., Vicar of Hampstead, and formerly Bishop of Bunbury, Western Australia. The object of the Campaign is to create a permanent missionary atmosphere in every parish of the Diocese; and the Service is arranged to gather together in prayer and thanksgiving as many as possible of those who, in their several parishes, have shared in, or been influenced by, the effort, and to deepen in them the sense of corporate privilege and responsibility in establishing the Sovereignty of God throughout the world. The Bishop of London will take part in the Service, and his Lordship earnestly hopes that there will be a large attendance both of Clergy and Laity. No tickets are required.
