I draw your attention to a letter from Mr. Churchwarden Carpenter, which appears elsewhere, respecting the War Memorial. I very heartily endorse the idea that we shall have, at the proper time, our own Memorial for our own heroes in *Hampton Hill*.

The Proposed War Memorial.

TO THE EDITOR.

Sir,—It appears from your report in last week's "Surrey Comet" of the war memorial meeting at Hampton that steps are to be taken at once to collect contributions for that object. Whilst every one of us desires, I am sure, that a suitable memorial or memorials shall be raised to the memory of our local men, I would remind residents in Hampton Hill that at a meeting held just a year ago it was decided that Hampton Hill people would provide a memorial in the place for those from or connected with the village who have fallen in the war, and that when the appropriate time arrives later on to collect subscriptions and take other steps a further meeting would be held. The intention is to make it a fully representative parish memorial, and its nature and the site will be determined in due time with that sole object in view. Though a banking account has been opened, it is not desired to divert money which at the moment is so urgently needed for the prosecution of the war, but any who desire to promise something later on are invited to write to Mr. A. J. Kestin (the hon. treasurer, *pro tem.*), at Isledon, Wellington Road, Hampton Hill. Those who are able to contribute to the Hampton memorial in addition should certainly not fail to support such a worthy object, but it would be very much better if we all refrained at the moment from any attempt to collect money which is wanted so urgently for National War Bonds or War Savings Certificates.
