We shall soon be keeping our Christmas Festival, and again it will be overshadowed by war; but none the less I very heartily wish you all the old wish of a "Happy Christmas." I hope we shall meet in Church at one or other of the services which will be as follows: Holy Communion 7, 8, Matins, Sermon, and Holy Communion 11, Carol Service 6 p.m.

I draw your special and sympathetic attention to the Sale of Work on behalf of the Missions of the Church which takes place in the Church Room on Wednesday, December 5th. It will be opened by Mrs. D. E. Norton at 2.30., and will continue until 5.30. It is our great effort to support those who are "at the front" in the perpetual war which the Church is waging against evil in all parts of the world.

Mr. Gilberthorpe has left us, but before going he received a fountain pen from his choir boys, a silver-mounted umbrella from the adult members of the choir, and a substantial cheque from a number of his friends. He asks me to thank very heartily all those who contributed to these gifts.

Mr. Russe, F.R.C.o., &c., has been appointed organist, and will commence his duties on December 1st. I am sure we shall give him a warm welcome and support. Miss Storey and Miss Lush very kindly acted as organists during the inter-regnum.

The churchwardens tell me that the Church Expenses Fund needs a more generous support through the offertories. We began the year with a considerable deficit, and I hope you will see your way to an increase in the amount given in Church for that object.

Mr. W. Jordan, secretary of the C.E.T.S., presented an encouraging report at the annual meeting held on Nov. 20. During the year there has been an increase in membership, and the credit balance is a substantial one.

The C.E.M.S. had a very successful gathering

on November 13, when Mr. Scott gave another of his excellent lectures on India. You will be glad to hear that he has kindly promised to give another later on.

Last January more than 40 persons received gifts of 5 cwts. of coal from the amount collected by the carol singers, organised by the Misses Ovington-Jones: they have very kindly consented to repeat the effort this year, and they may feel assured of generous support; the amount will be given in groceries, &c., early in the New Year.

The Metropolitan Secretary of the C.M.S. will pay his first visit to S. James on December 23rd, when he will preach at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m.

At the Hampton Ruri-decanal Conference recently held at Twickenham, the Evangelistic sub-committee reported that special services had been arranged, including a Quiet Day for the whole Rural Deanery, in the early part of next year. Approval was given to the efforts the General Purposes Committee are making to secure the stoppage of music in cinemas on Sundays. The Foreign Missions sub-committee detailed the special efforts they have made to awaken interest in the Rural Deanery by special services. The Young People's sub-committee asked for better support throughout the Deanery in organising, through local workers, the boys and girls who at present evade or do not receive religious instruction of any kind. It was decided that the Conference should meet quarterly in January, April, July and October.
