I was glad to remind the onlookers, of whom there were many, how much the boys and girls had done and were still doing, to "carry on" the War. Eggs, socks, money, &c., have been gladly contributed by the children. At the close, Miss Brewer kindly distributed the Scripture Prizes to the boys.

I have called a Meeting of subscribers to the Day School Fund for June 1st, at 6 p.m., in the Church Room, to elect a School Foundation Manager. Notices will be sent, but if anyone fails to receive a notice I hope this announcement will do instead.

The sum of \pounds_{17} 11s. 2d. was handed to me for the School Funds as the result of the recent Whist Drive. This is excellent, and much appreciated by the Managers. Very necessary repairs to the School Buildings will be at once put in hand. At the early Celebration on June 16th, the work of the G.F.S. will be specially remembered, and on S. Peter's Day, June 29th, we are asked to bear in mind in our prayers the anxious and important work carried on by the missions in connection with the S.P.G.

On the Wednesday Evening Service during June and July I hope to give Addresses on "The First Epistle of S. Peter."
