For the first time since I have been Vicar I am able to wish you all a very Happy Christmas without the shadow of war hanging over our Country and our homes. It was very delightful to see so many of you in Church to thank God for His great mercy in giving Victory to the Allied Countries, and our very earnest prayer must now be that we may be led to a durable and righteous peace.

I am glad that it has been decided to erect a memorial in the Village Churchyard to those who have given their lives for us in the war. A strong and representative Committee of more than thirty has been elected to make the necessary arrangements, and it is hoped that a donation, however small, will be given by every inhabitant in the Parish. You will shortly be called upon for that purpose. It will be a thank offering for the safety and deliverance which the sacrifice of these brave men and lads has secured for us.

The Annual Sale of Work for Church Missions will take place in the Church Room, at 3 p.m., on Wednesday, December 4th. I am sure that one outcome of this War and Peace will be the desire on the part of Christians that the Kingdom of God shall be extended, specially among those peoples who form an important part of the British Empire.

Probably the last Whist Drive to send a Xmas gift to our soldiers and sailors was held at the Boys' School, on Wednesday, November 20th. It was well attended, and I hear that the financial result was satisfactory.

The Jumble Sale for Missions and Parochial Funds produced a substantial sum. Mrs. Poley will announce the result in next month's Magazine.

The Churchwardens ask me to announce that under the new diocesan arrangement the financial year ends on December 31st, they are very anxious, and I cordially agree with them, that it shall close

without any deficit; it may be that some of you will feel moved to make a special thank-offering on Xmas Day that this desirable object may be achieved.

Again I wish you, every one of you, a very Happy and Holy Christmas-tide.
