FOOTBALL CLUB. A Whist Drive on behalf of the funds of this Club will take place in the Boys' School, on Wednesday, September 3rd.

Missions. The Society of the Propagation of the Gospel is arranging for a vigorous campaign during the autumn and winter in order to raise its income, the increased cost of food and clothing throughout the world making it impossible for the Society to maintain the work in which it was engaged before the war unless the income expands. It is estimated that a sum of at least £300,000 is needed for maintenance, compared with £262,000 last year, and that new work which the S.P.G. must undertake will cost £250,000. The Committee hopes the increase will be sufficient to allow of a permanent advance and the maintenance of the additional work which the Peace Fund will help to inaugurate. For the seven months of the year up to the end of July the total income of the ordinary fund was £103,200, against £93,500 in 1918. The Secretary for this Parish is Miss Brewer, Revidge, Park Road.
