MY DEAR PEOPLE,

I regret being unable to arrange any special services this year for Lent, but I am strictly forbidden, just at present, doing any work beyond what is absolutely necessary. I hope, however, to have our usual Holy Week and Good Friday services, and to give the addresses at the "Three Hours'" Service myself on Good Friday; the choir will render Stainer's "Crucifixion" on Wednesday in Holy Week, March 31, at 8 p.m.

You will find, elsewhere, suggestions for Prayers and Thanksgivings for the month, which I trust you will make a point of using; some of you, I know, bring them with you at the Holy Communion, and I strongly recommend the adoption of this plan.

By the death, after a long illness very patiently borne, of Miss Bessie Jordan, we lose the services of a very devoted member of S. James' Church; whether in Sunday School or Band of Hope, her work for God was ready and efficient and oftentimes she helped beyond her strength. She has now passed to a higher service for the Master Whom she so loyally served; her parents have the deepest sympathy of us all.

On Feb. 9th Mrs. Brewer passed away, and we shall miss the kindly presence and sweet disposition which greatly endeared her to those who knew her; to her family the loss is great, and we all share their sorrow. An additional notice will appear next month.

The Confirmation, usually held in March, has been deferred this year by the Bishop to June 28th. I shall be glad to receive the names of those who desire to be prepared for this sacred rite.

At the Vestry Meeting held on Jan. 28th it was unanimously agreed that a Faculty for the erection of our War Memorial should be applied for. With one small addition, the list as

printed last month will be carved on the monument. The work is now well in hand, and I hope soon to be able to give an approximate date when it will be completed.

I am grateful to those who have volunteered as "Church Cleaners" since I last mentioned the necessity for more helpers; there is still one vacancy.

A generous response has been given to the "Curates' Fund." A first list of subscribers is now published. You will be glad to hear that Mr. Duncan has consented to help in the Church services till we are able to secure a "whole-time" Curate.

You will notice that we have a new "inset" in the magazine this month, and in future there will be more local matter printed. I hope this will increase its circulation and also its general interest.

We were all sorry to hear of the sudden death of Mr. Lange, of Hanworth Road. He was a very generous contributor of flowers to S. James' Church on all festivals; we offer our condolence to his widow and children.
