Mr. Barnett, the Westminster Police Court Missionary, gave a short practical address on temperance in the home, coupled with consideration and kindness between husband and wife, for the lack of a comfortable home so often drove husbands to intemperance. After refreshments there were some round games, and an enjoyable evening finished about 10 o'clock.

The next Social Gathering will be on Friday, 11th March, at the Boys' School, in School Road, at 7.30 p.m. All parishioners are welcome, and we hope there will be the usual full attendance. ESSAY by Eileen Greenwood, Age 9.

"A Day in the Country."

"I spent a very happy day in the country last summer. I stayed with an Aunt at a place called High Wycombe. My mother, my sister

and I, got up early to go and visit some friends who lived three miles outside the town. We walked along country lanes where all the corn was ripe in the fields and some was being cut by machines, which tied them up ready to carry. In another field the hay was being tossed by old ladies in big bonnets, it was very jolly to watch them. Then a farmer gave me a ride in his cart because I was tired. Then we reached our destination in time for dinner. Then we all went out on to the common, which was all purple with heather, and played hide-and-seek among the furze bushes, then we all went to pick nuts which mother said were not ripe enough to eat. After having a nice rest and our tea on the common, we started to walk back home a different way through fields all pink with clover. Sometimes a rabbit would dart out from under the bushes, and at seeing us would scamper away terrified. We arrived home very tired but very pleased with our day. The place we visited was called King's Hill, and it is three-and-a-half miles from High Wycombe. We went to bed at half-past nine, after a very long and happy day in the country."
