My Dear People,

This Church and Parish have recently lost three of its oldest supporters and friends. Mrs. Musgrave, who was, I suppose, the oldest seat-holder in the Church, and for many years, with other members of her family, took great interest in S. James. Mrs. Stutchbury, a supporter specially of work connected with District Nursing, and will be much missed. Mr. Edwin Makepeace, an old and much respected resident, and was for 35 years a valued member of the Choir. To all those who are mourning their loss we offer our deep sympathy.

The Confirmation Classes will be held in the Vestry as follows:—For Lads: On Tuesdays at 8.15 p.m., beginning May 3rd; For Girls: On Wednesdays at 6 p.m., beginning May 4th. I hope these times will be convenient, if not, perhaps intending Candidates will let me know.

The Easter Vestry was held on March 31st. Very excellent balance sheets were presented by the various Treasurers. Mr. C. H. Evans was unanimously elected Churchwarden for the Parishioners, and I nominated Mr. C. H. Carpenter as mine. At the close of the Vestry, the Annual Meeting of Church Parochial Electors was held, when the Council was chosen for the ensuing year and various matters delegated to them for discussion.

I am sorry to say that Mr. Russe's acceptance of the post of Organist at Kew, necessitates his curtailing some of his work in this parish. At my request, he has consented still to continue as Choir Master, and I have appointed Mr. P. C. Rowe as organist; he comes with the highest credentials and has formerly held positions of considerable importance in the musical world.

The "Socials" are still booming; we had an excellent gathering and programme on April 15th,

and as a result of these, 37 new members have joined the C.E.T.S. The next "Social" is at 7.45, on Friday, May 13th.

The present unrest calls for much earnest prayer and for guidance; may I suggest that specially at Whitsun-tide we shall pray for a large out-pouring of the Holy Spirit, our "Guide and Comforter" upon the world, and in particular, upon the members of the Church, many of whom are placed in positions of considerable danger and difficulty.
