A year ago I asked for additional assistance in the Boys' Sunday School, and I am pleased to announce that Miss Charles and Miss Dawson have undertaken this very important work of the Church.

The Services in St. James' Church were happy and bright on Christmas Day, and despite the storm, the II a.m. Service was well attended. The Church was beautifully decorated by the usual band of skilled helpers. I am thankful to say that the "envelopes" for Waifs' and Strays' contained £3 5s. od., which will be very gratefully received by the Parent Society.

The Parish has lost its oldest inhabitant by the death of Miss Kennedy, who for many years had lived here and took a keen interest in everything. She will be missed by many of her old friends, but for her, we know "it is well." The Parish Almanacks are now ready, and may be obtained from the District Visitors or the Verger—price one penny; they contain full particulars of the various parochial organizations.

I am glad to say that Mr. Simmons has kindly undertaken to act as Treasurer of the Parish Magazine as from January 1st. We are grateful for this additional service which he will be rendering the Church.

The Whist Drive for the C.L.B. and Old Boys' Football Club was a great success, I hear that more than £17 was the net result.

You will find elsewhere a list of Subscribers up to December 20th, to Mr. Job's Memorial. The design for the window has been chosen and the work will be put in hand at once.

We were all sorry to hear that Mr. Hallt has had a very anxious Christmas-tide owing to the illness of his wife. I am glad to say she is now recovering.
