At the Working Party held at Mrs. Joseph's, Rocdene, on Friday, March 17th, Miss Seeley gave an interesting address on the work of the Colonial and Continental Church Society. She spoke very convincingly about the difficulties of British settlers in distant out-posts of the Empire. Many are twenty, thirty, forty, or even more miles from a Church, so can very rarely attend a service or share in the privileges of Church membership. Contrast this with life at home, where we have Churches almost at our doors, and yet how many never enter a Church from one year's end to another! It is hoped that in the autumn we may have in S. James's School a Lecture (illustrated by lime-light views), which will tell us more of the work of the Society.
