MY DEAR PEOPLE,

I ask your earnest prayers, specially at Holy Communion on behalf of the candidates who were confirmed on June 27th. The future of the Church depends largely on the faithfulness, devotion and courage of these young recruits; there never was a time when more of these graces were needed for the soul's life, let us make it a matter of definite prayer during July.

The annual open-air Temperance Meeting will be held in the Vicarage Garden, on Tuesday, July 11th, at 7.30, for which an attractive programme is being arranged, and a speaker from headquarters secured.

I am glad to say that Mr. Keble will tell us something about the work of the Waifs' and Strays' Society, on Sunday, July 2nd, at 11 a.m., and Mr. Lloyd, a blind priest, will speak to us of the work done for the blind, on July 16th, at 11 a.m.

The three departments of the Sunday Schools will have their annual "treat" on Saturday, July 29th, in the Vicarage field. I shall be glad to receive contributions towards the cost.

At the last meeting of the Parochial Church Council, attention was drawn to the necessity of maintaining the Sunday Collections for Church Expenses to about £6, to enable the Churchwardens to meet current liabilities. A Committee was also appointed to consider the question of extending the present Free-will Offering Scheme.

I need not remind you that the success of the Garden Fête on July 26th, particulars of which are found on another page, depends upon the hearty co-operation of every friend of St. James' Church.

### MISSIONARY WORKING PARTY.

### C.C.C.S. CENTENARY.

In July the Colonial & Continental Church Society enters upon its hundredth year; for it was founded on June 30th, 1823. At first it was the Newfoundland Society for Educating the Poor, but it soon developed work on the mainland of Canada. Later it joined with another Society working in Western Australia. As time went on it took up work in all parts of the Empire, and particularly in Canada, always moving amongst the new settlers on the outskirts of civilization. Still the call for its help comes from many quarters—from Western Canada, East Africa, and the Australian Bush, for instance; and all the more because of the plans for British emigration. The Society seeks to raise a Centenary Fund of £100,000 to enable it to advance in accordance with these demands. The cause is great, and worthy of enthusiastic support. Its aim is "The Empire for Christ." In every parish, ours included, there are some families at least who have friends in the distant Colonies. Thus every congregation should be eager to join in helping to found the ministry of the Gospel amongst our own people far away.
