SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL.

A two days' Sale and Market in aid of the General Fund of the S.P.G. will be held at Sion College, on Wednesday, October 18th, from 2 to 8 p.m., and on Thursday, October 19th, from 12 noon to 8 p.m.

The Opening Ceremony will take place each day at 3 p.m. On Wednesday—Chairman: The Rt. Rey. the Lord Bishop of Stepney; Opener: The Lady Bertha Dawkins. On Thursday—Chairman: The Rt. Rev. the Lord Bishop of Willesden; Opener: The Lady Mayoress. Admission on each day up to 5 p.m., 1/-; after 5 p.m., 6d.

The Hampton Deanery is again responsible for the refreshments, and gifts in money or kind are earnestly desired. They should be sent to the Parochial Secretary not later than October 16th, but it would be a great help to the Committee to know by September 30th what contributions they may expect. Last year the response was most generous, and over forty pounds profit was made on the Hampton R.D. Stall. It is hoped very much that this sum may be surpassed this year, and that every parish in the Deanery, which supports the Society, may be able to take part in the effort.

A large body of helpers will be needed, and the Decanal Secretary, Miss Jakeman (Larkfield, Hampton Hill), will be glad to receive names of those who will undertake to come up to Sion College on either or both days.
