MY DEAR PEOPLE,

The attendances at the Wednesday and Thursday special Lent Services have so far been most encouraging. The Rev. Prebendary Osborne is to be the Preacher at the two remaining Wednesday Evening Services. The Rev. T. Hartley Jackson will continue his course on the first two Thursdays in this month. We are all grateful to Mr. Jackson for his instructive and helpful addresses.

I commend to your notice the services during Holy Week. I hope to see as many as possible at the Preparation Service for their Easter Communion on the Tuesday in Holy Week, at 8 p.m. A good congregation on the Wednesday evening in Holy Week will not only be an encouragement to the choir, but should be of spiritual benefit to those present. I have been fortunate enough to secure Mr. Browell, the Vicar of Feltham, to conduct the "Three Hours' Meditations" on Good Friday, from 12-3 p.m. It is not necessary for me to remind you that Good Friday is a Holy Day and not a holiday. It is the day on which the Lamb of God was sacrificed for the sin of the world; the Day of Atonement when our Saviour, by giving His Life's Blood, Redeemed Mankind, and made it possible for man to be at one with God again. It is a day then, to be spent close to Jesus and not in pleasure. It is the climax to Lent and well spent, the prelude to a joyful Easter. On Good Friday evening there will be a Lantern Service in the Boys' School at 8 o'clock.

You will find the Services for Easter Day under the Parish News. May you all spend a very happy Easter. I shall be very grateful for

gifts of flowers for the Easter decorations.

It is with much sorrow that I am continually hearing from those whose relations lie in the Churchyard that the flowers they put on their graves have been stolen. It is a piece of wanton desecration, and those who are guilty of such a crime must have lost all sense of the moral fitness of things. I deeply sympathise with all who are thus victimised, and can assure them that we are doing everything possible to put a stop to this wicked thieving.

The Confirmation this year is at our own Church, on Monday, June 30th. You will find the arrangement for classes under the Parish News. If, however, there are any who cannot attend these classes, I shall be only too pleased to arrange times convenient to them.

The proceeds of the Jumble Sale to be held in the Boys' School, on the Wednesday in Easter Week, will be divided between organisations in the Parish which are in need of funds. The Nurse Fund will come in for a good share of the profits.

The Concert to be given by the children of the Band of Hope on the 30th April commends itself to the support of all. By this means we hope to make this organisation self-supporting, besides being able to assist other funds. The price of the seats are so reasonable that we look forward to a "bumper house."

In view of the Parochial Church Meeting to be held on the Wednesday in Easter Week, it would be well for all to see that their names are placed on the Electoral Roll as soon as possible. Forms for this purpose may be obtained from the Verger or the Churchwardens. It is from the Parochial Church Meeting that the Church Council is elected, and also the representatives

This time we shall go to the Boys' School where appliances for operating the lantern are more convenient. The Subject will be "The Wonderful Story of Zionism," and it will be given by the Rev. A. J. Culwick, one of the Secretaries of the Church Missions to the Jews. The collection will be given to this Society.
